# THE POSTAL HISTORY OF BOER PRISONERS OF WAR ON BERMUDA

Book 12 in a series of 25

The B.L. du Plessis Philatelic Collection of Boer War Postal History

This includes the "PENKOPPE" correspondence and matters relating to the minors who were taken captive during the Boer War. The larger number of the minors taken captive ended up in Bermuda.



#### Book 12:

#### **BERMUDA:**

After the internment camps in India were filled to capacity an alternative place overseas was to be found to house the Boer Prisoners of War captured during 1901 and towards the latter part of the War. At the end of 1901 there was about 160 000 of the Boer civilian population held in concentration camps making it necessary to accommodate men and boys captured under arms overseas. There was a ever increasing fear by the British that those incarcerated would escape and rejoin the War. To overcome this the POW's were shipped to overseas camps the last of which were the camps on the islands of Bermuda.

Preparation were afoot during April of 1901 to accommodate the Boer POW arrivals on Bermuda, which arrived on the 26th June 19901 on the S.S. Armenian. They were accompanied by a Company of the 2nd Battalion The Royal Warwickshire Regiment which had been withdrawn from service in South Africa. The POW's destined for Bermuda included a number of "Cape Rebels" who had been sentenced to life long penal servitude. They were easily distinguishable from the rest having a special prisoner outfit with chicken spoor markings and some who had been convicted of murder still wearing the marksman's heart target on their clothes. They were held in a separate barbed wire enclosure known as "Die Ramkamp" and "Special Enclosure". The Governor of the Islands Barker was not happy that he had these men amongst the POW's as the convict element was disturbing to him as he did not have the facilities for handling convicts. The majority of them (250) arrived on the Harlech Castle in December 1901.

The following is the analysis of the arrivals:

Darrell's and Burts Island were the first to be occupied while Hawkins held the largest concentration of POW's amongst whom were children from 6 years to the age of 80 years. Tucker's Island held those who were prepared to take the Oath of Allegiance known amongst their colleagues as "Handsuppers" or "Kahki Boers".

Miss Maria Outerbridge was well disposed towards the Boers. Her home was the rendezvous point for those who attempted to escape.

Bermuda was well known for the Boer artefacts made there, especially the walking sticks and other wooden which are highly collectible even today.

This exhibit is dedicated to the honour of COLIN BEMBOW who is well known for his study of the conditions under which the Boer POW's were held on Bermuda and some of his photographs and cover utilized by me in the preparation of the exhibits. It reveals the conditions under which the POW's lived on various Islands.

The Exhibit has had various accolades and is prepared on OPEN CLASS format.

Amongst the POW's on Bermuda were a great number of "PENKOPPE" or minors under the age of 21 years some of which were captured under arms fighting the Boer cause and which Penkop Correspondence is inserted herein showing postal history addressed to "PENKOPPE" as POW's in various camps.

The original CD's of this collection remain filed in the research section of the British Library, Philatelic Section, London.

#### Introduction:

With the progress of the War the number of prisoners increased raising serious accommodation problems for the British. Large camps would place a heavy burden on the supply lines in a war that was being fought on a wide front and in addition the thought of escape and the possibility of an insurrection at the Cape forced the British to find a solution by sending the prisoners overseas.

Initially camps overseas were opened in St. Helena, then in Ceylon followed by India and finally in Bermuda. On the 29<sup>th</sup> April 1901 a communication from the War Office in London intimated that prisoners of war were be sent to Bermuda. The British Government entered into leases for Darrel's Island and others


from the Admiralty and the Seon family. By the end of May a detachment of Royal Engineers had been despatched to Bermuda to ready the islands for the arrival of the Boer Prisoners of War and some number of "Convicts" being Cape Rebels who had been found quilty of assisting the "enemy" and had been sentenced to penal servitude with hard labour. They were distinguished by the chicken- spoor marking on the back of their overall.

Picture of Cape Rebels entrained for shipment to Bermuda:




By the 26th June 1901 the Camp Commandants HQ on Ports Island was operational. The first group of POWs arrived on the 28th June 1901 aboard the SS Armenian accompanied by the 2th Battalion of the Royal Warwickshire Regiment. In all six shiploads of POWs were landed in the Bermudas from the 28th June 1901 to the 16th January 1902.

## BERMUDA: PREPARATIONS FOR PRISONERS OF WAR FROM SOUTH AFRICA:

The final activation of Prisoner of War Camps was those determined for the Islands of Bermuda. During May 1901 Royal Engineers sailed from Chatham to ready the islands for the influx of POWs.On the 26th June 1901 the S.S. Armenian dropped anchor with a compliment of 963 Prisoners accompanied by a Company of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion of the Warwickshire regiment withdrawn from South Africa. On arrival the POWs were drafted to Burts ⊕ Darrells while trouble makers who had attempted to overpower the guards in Simons Town harbour were sent to the "Small Enclosure" or the "Ram Camp" on Tucker's Island.



Despite an attempt at mutiny in Simon's Town harbour the SS Armenian arrived with a large number of POWs who were mainly from those captured at Paardeberg with the surrender of General Cronje, On arrival and after medical checks the men were transferred to DARRELL'S and BURT'S islands. With the arrival of more transports these camps were filled by the end of July 1901.

Cover front from JOHANNESBURG with 1d ZAR adhesive optd ERI and tied with a Johannesburg cds dated 7 OCT 01 with oval black Johannesburg Censor cachet on the front. The cover is addressed to PETRUS JOHANNES ANDRIES VAN DEN BERG(H) Prisoner No 4358 aged 48 years from CHRISTIANA who was captured together with his son DAVID STEPHANUS VAN DEN BERG(H) Prisoner No 4359 aged 17 years at Paardeberg on the 27th February 1900 serving with the J. Bosman Commando both of whom were sent to Bermuda.

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Registered Inter Camp cover from KLERKSDORP CONCENTRATION CAMP with 3 x 1d QV GB 1d K\Lilac adhesives tied by FPO 16 cds dated OCT 3 1901 with double violet Censor cachet dated 3 OCT 1901 Klerksdorp with usual blue crayon markings and black pen "R" marking on the front. The reverse shows London registered transit strike and Hamilton arrival strike. The use of British adhesives was accepted as common practice in the Klerksdorp Concentration camp but not from other camps. The cover is addressed to RENIER JANSEN VAN RENSBURG Prisoner No 25137 aged 17 years (Penkop) from the farm VOGELDRAAI district HEILBRON who was captured on the farm on the 31" October 1900 with pencil manuscript "Not Darrells" on the front.



Cover from ABERDEEN with backflap missing franked with a 1d CGH adhesive tied by an Aberdeen eds and that tied by British Censor Seal tied by a purple double oval Censor eachet dated 14 JAN 1902 and black circular Censor eachet applied at Cape Town. The reverse shows manuscript by the addressee giving his information and personal handstamp 'H.R. SCHOLTZ". The front shows manuscript "Not Darrells". The cover is addressed to HENDRIK RUDOLPH SCHOLTZ Prisoner No 20345 aged 20 years (Penkop) from the farm UITKYK district WOLMARANSSTAD who was captured at ZWARTFONTEIN on the 1" January 1901 serving with the Lichtenburg Commando and who was sent to Bermuda from Ladysmith. There were more than 300 (penkoppe) youngsters held on the Bermudas.



#### PRISONERS OF WAR:

The last consignment of POWs arrived on the SS Montrose on the 16th January 1902 with well over a 1000 men. In total 4619 POWs arrived while a total of 34 died en route and were buried at sea. Mail was incoming from South Africa, from Overseas and from Overseas camps and outgoing to the same destinations. A large number of the POWs sent to Bermuda were from the Transvaal and were those POWs captured from mid 1901 to February 1902.

A picture of the S.S. MONTROSE which brought many of the Prisoners who were held at TIN TOWN in Ladysmith to Bermuda. On her last voyage she delivered 1259 POWs on the 17th January 1902 to mainly HAWKIN'S Island.



On her second voyage the S.S. MONTROSE had 5 deaths at sea. On her first voyage during August/ September 1901 she had 23 deaths at sea. In all cases the dead were buried at sea.



#### LOCAL MAIL:

Inter person mail on the islands was almost non-existent. Nonetheless the occasional letter was sent conforming to existing postal regulations. They carried adhesives and were subject to Censorship and not easily come by.

Cover front from HAMILTON to DARREL'S with Id QV Bermuda adhesive tied with a Hamilton eds dated MR 1 02 and blue type CM1 censor cachet addressed to JURIE JOHANNES GELDENHUYS Prisoner No 17553 aged 53 years from the farm STRYDPOORT district VREDE who was captured at VREDE on the 9th October 1900 serving with the Kliprivier Commando.



Cover front from HAMILTON to DARREL'S but re-directed to BURT'S with 1d QV Bermuda adhesive tied with a Hamilton eds dated MR II 1902 and blue Type CM I censor cachet applied at Hamilton addressed to SAREL SMIT Prisoner No 26385 aged 17 years (Penkop) from the farm STERKFONTEIN district BETHAL who was captured together with his father STEFANUS JOHANNES SMIT Prisoner No26384 aged 42 years, his brother STEFANUS JOHANNES SMIT (Int) Prisoner No26387 aged II years and his uncle JACOBUS PETRUS SMIT No 26386 aged 49 years at ROTTERDAM on the 10th December 1901 serving with the Bethal commando all of whom were sent to Bermuda via Tin Town Ladysmith and the MONTROSE.



The convicts were delegated to the limestone quarries where they were forced to do hard labour and when necessary were despatched to dig graves for those POWs who had died. When a Prisoner of War died he was buried with full military honours as opposed to the Rebels who were buried without ceremony and in the absence of friends or mates in the camp. They were disallowed mail or communications. Rev. Albertyn however gave news to individuals in sermons he gave to the convicts by inserting news into the sermon which was given in Hollands as follows per example: "Ons lees vanoggend n paar verse uit Psalm 23, n Psalm van David. De Heere is myn Herder.. Ben de Klerk, ek het n brief van jou vrou oopgemaak. Alles gaan goed. Hulle het mooi reens gehad. Sy en die kinders verlang na jou." And other like messages were given.

Cover from BLOEMFONTEIN to HAWKIN'S with 1d ORC tied by Bloemfontein eds and addressed to HENDRIK JOHANNES ALBERTYN Prisoner No 25445 aged 26 years from the farm "NIET - DE - NU" or DONKERHOEK district GRAAFF REINET who was wounded and captured serving with the Scheepers Commando at DRIEFONTEIN on the 1" September 1901. As a Cape Rebel he was tried and found guilty of Plunder, Arson, High Treason and Theft and was sentenced to lifelong Penal Servitude.

Those who were involved in the abortive mutiny at Simons Town were sent to a special enclosure known as the "Draadkamp" or "Ramkamp" on TUCKER'S ISLAND. These mutineers and dissidents were treated harshly and were not allowed any privileges. They were treated as bandits and were held behind double rows of barbed wire fencing. They were allowed incoming mail only and were nor allowed to correspond. The convicts were enforced to do hard labour from morning to night under strict control and enforcement by special ruthless guards.

Cover from New York addressed to Commandant W. L. VAN DEVENTER who was held on TUCKER'S The cover shows that he was held in the "SMALL ENCLOSURE" and that the letter had been endorsed "Not Tuckers", "Try Darrell's". The cover could have been from an escapee or a Benefit Society in Boston.



Rev. Van Blerk made a note in his notebook on the 30<sup>th</sup> July 1902 that the Camp Commandant of Tuckers prohibited him visiting Van Deventer, Singleton and Coetzee in the special enclosure which he refers to as "..in 't Kleine Kampje." He also writes that on the 29<sup>th</sup> July 1902 350 "Blinkes" and Officers were sent back to S.A. Here he was referring to those who had taken the Oath.

On the 14th September 1901 the first 37 convicts arrived from South Africa on the MONTROSE troopship. They were accommodated in the Military Prison at St. George's where they received the same treatment as ordinary military prisoners. They remained at St. George's having no privileges until 3th January 1902 when they were removed to the "SPECIAL" or "SMALL ENCLOSURE" on HAWKIN'S ISLAND. A Further compliment of 180 convicts arrived on the 18th January 1902 bringing their total to 255. Most of these convicts were Cape Colonialist Rebels although a few among them were foreigners. Many of them had been sentenced to death for High Treason but had had their sentences commuted to Penal Servitude for life. Their convictions arose from various offences committed against the Proclamations of War. After the War they were returned to South Africa and transferred to Tokai Prison where they were held until 1907 when their sentences were reprieved and they were set free.

Cover from PORT ALFRED with Id CGH tied by Port Alfred cals dated JA 29 02 with CMI Censor eachet in blue applied at Hamilton addressed to St Georges Island but re-directed to "AAG P of War PROSPECT". The cover is addressed to Commandant HENDRIK LODEWIJK LOOTS Prisoner No 21164 aged 32 years from the farm WAPADSBERG district GRAAFF REINET, a Cape Rebel, who was captured at KLIPFONTEIN on the 1" June 1900 serving with the Graaff Reinett Commando. He was found guilty of attempted murder and High Treason and sentenced to Lifelong Penal Servitude. He was sent to Bermuda on the Montrose.





The authorities were upset that "convicts" were being sent to the island together with POWs. They were unaware that the so-called convicts were Cape rebels and in many cases men who had been at war with the POWs but who had been sentenced to various sentences ranging from the death penalty to penal servitude for life as the were considered to be Cape Rebels and traitors to the Government of the Cape Colony. The convicts eventually numbered 250. The first 36 convicts arrived on the S.S. Montrose and the majority of the others 250 on the SS HARLECH CASTLE in December 1901. The convicts were clothed in a special uniform indicating a chicken spoor on their backs.

The convicts were treated as ordinary criminals and did not qualify for any privileges. GABRIEL PIETER GREEFF Prisoner No 25744 aged 34 years from the farm SLANGFONTEIN district BOETSAP or given as Border Siding TAUNGS was captured at Border Siding serving with the De Villiers Commando on the 29th July 1901 and sent to Hawkins. He was injured and despite being crippled like JACOBUS JOHANNES KRUGER Prisoner No19921 aged 43 years from the farm KLIPRIVIER district Vrede who was captured on the 21th May 1901 at Kliprivier serving the Kilprivier Commando they were put to do hard labour lying down and having crutches. The convicts held in the Special Enclosures were under close quard for fear of escape. They were treated harshly compared to the other inmates in the camps on the Islands.




The guard tower overlooking the convicts' enclosure.

A historical telegram sent from Dr. ANDREW MURRAY at KALK BAY on the 16th August 1901 to Rev. Van Blerk enquiring whether Van Blerk would go to Bermuda on Saturday and that he should contact Mr. C.P. SCHULTZ of the RELIEF COMMITTEE in CAPE TOWN immediately. Van Blerk was to go as additional Chaplain to Rev. ALBERTYN. Rev. Van Blerk accepted the calling and went off to Bermuda arriving there on the 21th October 1901. He did so at his own expense and went via Germany and New York.

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#### SPIRITUAL SUPPORT:

After Rev. Albertyn and his wife were expelled from the camps Rev. Van Blerk was advised by military HQ that he was strictly to comply with the conditions on which he was granted permission to be on the islands, namely:1. That he was granted permission soley for purpose of religious ministration amongst the prisoners.

2. The he was not allowed to deliver or receive any letter or parcels from the prisoners. 3. That he was not allowed to discuss any political matters with the prisoners nor to influence them directly or indirectly against the authorities. To close any lines of illegal communication Rev. van Blerk was given a choice of one camp to continue his ministry and chose HAWKIN'S as the greatest number of prisoners were held there. He remained until 1903 where after he wrote "Op die Bermudas Beland" giving the story of the camp.

A beautiful and explicit postcard sent from Bermuda by REV. VAN BLERK to his fiance Miss BESSIE VAN DER MERWE at the farm RIETFONTEIN district RICHMOND Cape Colony. It shows him standing on DARRELL'S ISLAND sending her Christmas wishes on the 25th December 1901 which she receives in South Africa. It was most probably painted by one of the POWs for him.



Rev. Van Blerk's personal notebook which was started after the news of the Declaration of Peace was received in Bermuda . It contains a number of names and addresses. It also reveals the detention of Du Toit and Van Deventer in the "Small Enclosure".



Extracts from the notebook:

Reference is made to Peace being declared and later the escape of Duquesne and Du Toit. He makes mention of visiting Du Toit in the "Small Enclosure" Du Toit was placed there as his escape failed. He was handed over to the authorities by Miss Outerbridge.

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An Entire from Rev. ANDREW MURRAY to Rev. J.A. VAN BLERK addressed c/o Sir DAVID TENNANT, Agent General for the Cape Colony in London. Correspondence directed to Rev. Van Blerk was sent via Sir David Tennant to ensure it was safely received. He writes about the shortage of Bibles for the approximately 4000 POWs expected to be on the Islands in Bermuda and that, he, (Van Blerk) is requested to contact the BIBLE SOCIETY in this regard.

Mrs. KOOPMANS DE WET advised Van Blerk: " Laat jou briewe stuur p/a Sir David Tennant, Agent-Generaal vir die Kaap Kolonie; hy is in die diens van ons Regering en is verplig om jou briewe agter jou aan te stuur, waarheen jy dit ook bestel" y 18 "Op Die Bermudas Beland" - Ds J.A. Van Blerk.

Rev. Van Blerk was on his way to Bermuda via Germany and London the letter addressed to him en route.

Mourning Cover on Official War Office Stationery undated and addressed to G. FLEETWOOD WILSON C.B. ASSISTANT UNDER SECRETARY OF STATE WAR OFFICE LONDON. The entire makes mention of gifts for the Burghers on Bermuda from Miss Parker of the USA. A Scarce and interesting item reflecting the concern shown by the American Public for the well being of the Boer Prisoner of War on Bermuda.



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A number of letters from Mrs Henry Hulst of Grand Rapids to Rev. Van Blerk. Mrs Hulkst arranged for necessities needed by the POWs to be sent to them. She makes mention that freight has been sent to them. In her letter of the 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1902 she says she is glad to send some money to Rev. Van Blerk for the prisoners under his charge. "Young people of CILLA, IOWA who raised it in various ways and they send it to be spent for food, as you can add to the diet or provide for those who are in special need. I am sending also \$100 to the RELIEF COMMITTEE of which we have heard for use in the other islands."



An Open Letter smuggled from the "BOEREN OFFICIER'S KAMP" on MORGAN'S ISLAND written in German by JOUBERT REITZ Prisoner No21388 aged 20 years from PRETORIA an Officer with the ZAR Artillery who was captured at MAJATE on the 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1901 who was sent to Bermuda on the Montrose and BARON ERNEST VON KHAYNACK Prisoner No 23803 aged 23 years c/o Baron Von Nuicke, Oostenwalde, Meele Germany, a German citizen and Officer captured as a spy in Cape Town on the 16<sup>th</sup> September 1901 and who was sent to Bermuda on the Montrose on the 7<sup>th</sup> November 1901.



The monotony of life made the establishment of a Boer Relief Committee essential. It came into being under the direction of Miss ANNA MARIA OUTERBRIDGE, Capt. W.E. MEYER and Mrs SELMA RECHT which provided for the requirements of the POWs and had a strong German-American connection. At a later stage it was enhanced with REV. J.A. VAN BLERK, REV. J.R. ALBERTYN and his wife, Mr HERMAN RECHT and Mrs MEYER. Miss OUTERBRIDGE harboured escapecs, obtained employment for others and arranged for the sale of curios made at the hands of POWS in the camps. Finished articles made by the POWs were sold by Miss Lough of the Women's Work Exchange.

The spiritual needs of the POWs was not neglected. Services were conducted twice daily in marquee tents or shacks. Rev. Albertyn came out on the SS Manila and was permitted to spend six months in Bermuda. Rev. Albertyn did ecclesiastical work while Mrs Albertyn taught the children. Rev. Albertyn preached to the men in the "stockade" or Ramkamp but was not allowed within the enclosure. He interspersed news in his sermons the guards who accompanied being unaware of the messages being sent. Mrs Albertyn assisted in the smuggling a letter from Joubert Reitz which appeared in the ROYAL GAZETTE resulting in the Albertyns being ordered back to South Africa in February 1902. They went to America where they advised the support groups of the situation in the camps. Letter to Mrs Rev. Albertyn from Mrs. Hulst of Grand Rapids. Mrs Hulst writes: "We have shipped to the Bermudas today three boxes and barrel full of clothes, paper, books etc and two boxes of soay 1870 lbs of freight. We hope to be able to purchase some of the toys etc made by the prisoners.



#### HOME INDUSTRY:

Examples of Boer handiwork are rare today. Carving became a large industry in all the camps. Amongst the articles made were curios and broaches made from coins and bone. The manufacture of walking sticks, pen markers, and various other items took place under the auspices of the Industrial Association. The manufactured goods were sent to the Americas for sale and became sought after by collectors as they are today.


#### CANTEENS:

An enterprising HENRY WILLIAM TAYLOR Prisoner No 11052 aged 21 years from the farm PELHAM district LADYBRAND who was captured at FOURIESBURG serving with the Korannaberg Commando and who was sent to Bermuda on the Armenian started a coffee bar known as "The Lions Den" where the POWs gathered to discuss various matters and to enjoy a cup of coffee. It is believed that about 200 Pounds was generated per month at the canteen. He stands to the left of the tree in the photo.

# BOER PRISONERS OF WAR BERMUDA: MANUSCRIPT MARKS IN INK, PENCIL OR CRAYON:

Cover from JOHANNESBURG to GREEN POINT re-addressed to BERMUDA with Id ZAR adhesive opid ERI and tied by a Johannesburg cds dated 2 APR Olwith blue POW censor cachet applied at Green Point with manuscript in blue crayon"Bermuda" with red pen manuscript "not Morgans" Pencil manuscripts "Not Camp 2", "Not Darrells", "Not Burts". The cover is addressed to JOHN ADRIAN LOMBARD Prisoner No 16020 aged 30 years from Johannesburg who was captured with De Wets forces at BOTHVILLE on the 6th November 1900 serving with Johannesburg (ZARPS) Commando and who was sent to Bermuda from Green Point.



Cover from PRETORIA (with GB adhesive applied)Id GB QV Lilac tied by a Pretoria cds date illegible with black triangular censor cachet applied at Pretoria. The cover is addressed to JACOBUS COENRAAD LOUW Prisoner No 19963 aged 33 years from the farm BUFFELSDOORN district Waterberg who was captured at WITKLIP on the 18th May 1901 serving with the Nylstroom Commando and who was sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith. The use of the British adhesives by Boers is unusual. It could perhaps be that this cover was from Irene Concentration Camp from his wife A.M. Louw, The front shows the various manuscript endorsements: "Not Burts, Not Darrells, Not Tuckers, Not Morgans" Where was he then?



#### BOER PRISONERS OF WAR BERMUDA: MANUSCRIPT MARKS IN INK, PENCIL OR CRAYON:

Post re-directed at Bermuda was endorsed by hand indicating the rotation of prisoners between the various islands. This was done to prevent the POWs escaping and to prevent them forming bonds to create insurrection.

Cover from STELLENBOSCII with 2 X CGH adhesives tied with Stellenbosch cds dated 9 DE 01 with violet boxed censor cachet of Stellenbosch on the front with Hamilton arrival strike on the reverse. The front shows ink manuscript" NOT DARRELL'S" on the front. The cover is addressed to WILLEM BACHOFNER Prisoner no 19450 aged 38 years from ERMELO who was captured at KLIPFONTEIN on the 26th May 1901 and who was sent to Burts Island Bermuda.



Cover from PRETORIA (with GB adhesives applied) 2x Id GB 1 Lilae tied by a Pretoria eds dated 12 DEC 01 with black triangular censor eachet applied at Pretoria. The cover is addressed to GERT DIEDERICK DE BEER Prisoner No 207 29 aged 24 years from the farm KJLIPKOP district Rustenberg who was captured at MAMPAS RIVER on the 1" July 1901 serving with the Rustenburg Commando and who was sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith.



The prison hospital was opened at the beginning of July 1901 under Col. North RAMC. Three surgeons and small staff operated the 110 bed facility and treated 950 cases in the first six months. 35 Men died in captivity some 12 due to incurable diseases and one who was shot at the fence. No 16870 was the alleged culprit. He was FREDERICK HENDRIK BOSCH Prisoner No16870 aged 16 years from Skinner Street PRETORIA who was captured at PRETORIA on 5th June 1901 and who was sent to Bermuda on the Armenian. He was shot by a guard with whom he had "arranged" to escape on the 27th April 1902. On death of a POW or Convict an inquest was held a Ports Island. A convict was then detailed to prepare a gravestone marker on which only a number, in sequence appeared.

CAREL STEFANUS DE HAAS Prisoner No 21023 aged 50 years from the farm RUSTHOEK district WAKKERSTROOM was captured together with his son GERRIT PETRUS DE HAAS Prisoner No 21022 aged 19 years on their farm serving with the Wakkerstroom Commando on the 29th July 1901. Both were sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith Tin Town. C.S. de Haas died on the 3th October 1901 from Pneumonia and is buried on LONG ISLAND grave no 8.

#### ATTEMPTS AT ESCAPE:

Not many POWs succeeded in escaping from Bermuda. The first attempt was by one of two brothers Du Plooy who had swum across the harbour to the S.S. Trinadad which sailed for New York. He was found when the vessel reached New York and initially held by Immigration authorities but later released. His brother was an irreconcilable in the camp. Later a trio escaped one of which was rounded up at Miss Outerbridge's gate he was HENDRIK INDEMAUR the others also found . They were sent to The Ramkamp in the TUCKER"S Island stockade. There were a number of other attempts at escape. ADOLPHUS DE WET sowed away to freedom as also a German named ALBRECHT who was mistaken as a stoker on the S.S. Trinadad. The New York Daily Tribune reported that he had arrived safely and was at liberty. BARON VON KAYNACH was collected from the home of Mr. Hernam Recht. On the 25th June 1902 FRITZ J DUQUESNE Prisoner No 24131 aged 23 years an American who was from Cape Town and NICOLAAS DU TOIT left BURT's illegally and made their way to Miss Outerbridge for assistance to escape. She agreed to assist one and by agreement to hand the other to the authorities. As Duquesne had already been proscribed he was sent to Capt. Meyer in St. George's where a ship was found for him making good his escape while Du Toit was handed over. Duquesne an Anglophobe became a master spy for Germany and a master at sabotage. He is believed to be the responsible for mining the H.M.S. HAMPSHIRE which caused the death of Lord Kitchner by drowning when the ship went down. He at last obtained retribution. A special reward was posted for his recapture. His escape is mentioned by Rev. Van Blerk herein.

DU TOIT was treated extremely harshly on account of his dissident attitude. He was given extremely hard labour as the picture shows and was bound and handcuffed to his bed at night.

Picture of Nicholas Jacobus Du Toit Prisoner No 13579 aged 28 years from the farm Deeiyan district Lichtenburg Who was captured at Rietfontein on the 27<sup>th</sup> September 1900 serving with the No1 Lichtenburg Commando and Who was sent to Bermuda on the Armenian on the 19<sup>th</sup> May 1901. He was a forceful dissident and was shackled and handcaffed by night. He was an immate of the penal camp at Bermuda.





#### DAILY ROUTINE:

The immates formed their own form of Government in the camps. The tents were arranged in lines of about 12 with 6 or 7 men to each. Each tent elected a "Foreman" who in turn chose a line "captain" who was responsible for the affairs and conduct of his men. The line "Captains" selected a camp "Commandant" who acted as spokesman for all the men with the Guard Commander. On Burt's, the first Commandant JAPIE(JACOB) HAUPTFLEISCH Prisoner No 18706 aged 25 years from Pretoria , a despatch rider with the Pretoria Commando who was captured at PUTFONTEIN on the 8th May 1901 serving with the Pretoria Commando, could not see eye to eye with Major Armstrong so LODEWIJK CHRISTIAN MARINUS WEGERIF Prisoner No 20671 aged 31 years from the farm WELTEVREDE district NYLSTROOM who was captured at SABIE RIVER on the 28th January 1901 serving with the NYLSTROOM Commando and who was sent to BURTS via Tin Town Ladysmith, was elected in his place. On Wegerif's resignation Captain RICHARD ALEXANDER KNIPE Prisoner No 19885 aged 39 years from the farm KAALSPRUIT district STANDERTON who was captured at Standerton on the 30th May 1901 serving with the Standerton Commando, was appointed the camp's final "Commandant". The chain of command worked well while internal discipline was maintained by the camp's "Landdrost." Roll Call was a daily routine.

Cover from BLOEMFONTEIN with 1d OFS Optid VRI and tied by Bloemfontein cds datyed15 OC 01 and NPR(Richards) Censor eachet applied at Bloemfontein and CM1 Censor eachet in blue applied at Hamilton.

The cover is addressed to LODEWIJK CHRISTIAN MARINUS WEGERIF abovementioned.



Cover from WELLINGTON with 1d CGH tied by Wellington cds dated De 22 01 with black circular Censor cachet applied at Cape Town and tied over the top with British Censor Seal and CM1 Censor eachet on front addressed to RICHARD ALEXANDER KNIPE abovementioned.



#### OUTGOING MAIL TO CEYLON CAMP:

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Postcard to DIYATALAWA with per-printed Bermuda QV Id adhesive tied by Hamilton cds date MR 29 1902 with Colombo transit strike and Diyatalawa arrival strike and Violet Type CM 3 censor cachet applied at Hamilton. Also Type D3 censor cachet of Diyatalawa E.J.B. (Baumann) applied in Ceylon on front.

The card is addressed to Master GORDON SPRAGG TRIEGAARDT Prisoner No 9320 aged 16 years (Penkop) from the farm BLYDSKAP district FICKSBURG who was captured at FOURIESBURG on the 30<sup>th</sup> July 1900 serving with the Ficksburg Commando and who was sent to Diyatalawa on the MONGOLIAN. This censor cachet is scarce. The cover is from J.H. GROENEWALD at DARRELL'S Island.

# INCOMING INTER CAMP MAIL:

Cover from MIDDELBURG CONCENTRATION CAMP dated 19 SEP 01 to GREEN POINT and Re-directed to Bermuda with 1d ZAR optid ERI and tied with Middelburg cds dated 19 SE 01 with black triangular Pretoria censor cachet and manuscript" Bermuda" in pencil on the front. The reverse shows the double serrated violet Burgher Camp Middelburg cachet and a Pretoria transit strike dated 23 SEP 01.

The cover is addressed to GERT J. STRYDOM (also known as STRIJTSMAN) Prisoner No 25281 aged 24 years from the farm ROOIPLAATS district UNIONDALE, a Cape Rebel who was captured and found guilty of Attempted Murder and High Treason and sentenced to Lifelong Penal Servitude. He was sent to Bermuda on the Montrose 93 and committed to gaol as a convict at St. George's Bermuda. He was subsequently transferred to HAWKIN'S Island.



Reverse of Cover:



In the ABW Philatelist dealing with the POW camps overseas research states that four censors were employed at Ports Island between June 1901 and June 1902. Four handstampy censor marks have been recorded with a further two sub types. No censor seals were used on the islands. The first and the commonest censor mark is an un-numbered 24cm diameter double circle circle mark with "PRISONERS OF WAR/BEREMUDA between the circles and "Passed/Censor" in the centre. It was applied from 16° July 1901 to the 13th June 1902. The mark numbered "2" is larger than type 1 consisting of a double bordered single circle 28mm in diameter with "PRISONERS OF WAR/BERMUDA" around the perimeter and in the centre "PASSES CENSOR" with line above and and numeral "2" below, It appeared from 5th November 1901 to 27th June 1902. Many cover have manuscript endorsements "Not Darells" "Not Tuckers" etc on the fronts indicating that the prisoners were rotated between different camps and that their post was re-directed. Cover from BRUSSLES Belgiam( with one adhesive torn away) with 10 C adhesive tied by Brussels eds dated DEC 12 01 with Type 1 blue Censor cachet on the front. The cover is addressed to: MARIUS CORNELIUS SCHENER Prisoner No 21438 aged 24 years from Pretoria who was captured at BLOEDRIVER on the 29th July 1901 serving with the Pretoria Commando a Hollander who was sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith.



Cover from a POW on BERMUDA to GRONINGEN Holland and re-directed to Zivolle with 2 ½ d QV Bermuda adhesive tied by a Hamilton cals dated AP 2 1901 with Bermuda Type 2 censor cachet and Groningen arrival strike dated 15 APR 02 on the front. The reverse shows Groningen transit and Zivolle arrival strike on the reverse.



# BOER PRISONERS OF WAR ON BERMUDA:

Censor cachet Type 3 in the form of a triangle with point down containing "PRISONERS OF WAR/...Passed Censor 3 /...BERMUDA struck in violet was used from 5th November 1901 to 13th July 1902..The cover Inter Camp from MEREBANK P.O.A. 73 to Burts Island Bermuda is addressed to WILLEM DE JAGER Prisoner No 19824 aged 31 from the farm UITKOMST district ERMELO who was captured at WELGELEGEN on the 26th May 1901 and who was sent to BERMUDA via Ladysmith



Inter Camp postcard from BERMUDA to DIYATALAWA with pre-stamped 1/2d adhesive tied by Hamilton eds dated FE 25 1902 with Colombo transit strike dated MR 10 02 on the front with circular "T" and Rectangular black Taxed eachet "Amount to be collected "5" Centimes" with blue censor markings and Diyatalawa Type 2 E.J.B. Censor eachet E.J.B. (Baumann) censor eachet on the front. The cover is addressed to JAN JACOBUS LUDIK Prisoner No 27171 aged 12years (Penkop) from KLERKSDORP TOWN who was captured at TWEELINGSPAN on the 13th December 1901 serving with the Klerksdorp Commando and who was sent to Ceylon.

Inter Camp Cover from GREEN POINT to TIN TOWN LADYSMITH re-directed to BERMUDA with 1d CGH adhesive tied by Green Point eds dated MY 25 01 with outgoing POW censored mail cachet "Green Point" with orange crayon manuscript "Bermuda" and manuscripts: "Not Morgan's, Not Darrells, Not Burts" on the front, The reverse shows Ladysmith arrival and transit strike as also Durban and Hamilton. The Cover is addressed to CAREL LODEWIJK VAN DER MERWE Prisoner No 18014 aged 36 years from the farm KRANSSPRUIT district KROONSTAD who was captured at Kroonstad on the 14the March 1901 serving with the Mid Valsch River Commando and initially sent to Green Point.



Cover from ROODEPOORT to BERMUDA with Id ZAR optd ERI tied by Roodepoort csd dated 27 JAN 02 with partial black Johannesburg censor eachet on the front with Johannesburg and Hamilton transit and arrival strikes on the reverse. The manuscripts "Not Darrells and Not Hawkins" in pencil manuscript appear on the front. The cover is addressed to JAN CHRISTOFFEL VAN GRAAN Prisoner No 11258 aged 34 years from ROODEPOORTB TOWN district KRUGERSDORP who was captured at Roodepoort on the 26th August 1900 serving with the De Villiers Commando.



HERMANUS CHRISTIAN VAN BRAKEL Prisoner No 25557 aged 77 years who was captured together with his son ADRIAN JOHANNES VAN BRAKEL Prisoner No 24560 aged 50 years and his grandsons HERMAN CHRISTIAN VAN BRAKEL Prisoner No 24561 aged 16 years and HENDRIK JACOBUS VAN BRAKEL Prisoner No 24562 aged 14 years from the farm BULTHOEK district BETHLEHEM at FANNY'S HOME on the 11th November 1901. They were sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith. The 79 year old VAN BRAKEL with 500 Pounds kept his worldly wealth in money in a belt strapped to his waist because he could never find anyone able to change a five pound note. He returned to South Africa with his life savings intact.

Some of the Prisoners of war were able to obtain employment in the camps or in Hamilton or with private people at a small wage. They did clerical work for 2/- p.d. while others provided unskilled labour for construction projects and for the off loading of coal at the rate of 1d per hour. They were called "Pennyboys".

The cover is addressed to SALDOOR JACOBUS HENRICO Prisoner No 19804 aged 30 years from the farm KLIPDRIFT district PRETORIA who was captured at RIETFONTEIN together with his brother STEFANUS JACOBUS HENRICO Prisoner No 19805 aged 43 years from the same farm, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1900 serving with the Apiesriver Commando. Both sent via Tin Town holding camp in Ladysmith to Bermuda.

VILJOEN at the Norval's Pont Concentration Camp as will appear from the notes on the reverse of the photo and on the right DAVID SCHALK VILJOEN Prisoner No 19324 aged 41 years from the farm VLAKFONTEIN district FAURESMITH who was captured at METZ serving with the Fauresmith Commando, all of whom were sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith.

It is noted that JACOBUS JOHANNES VILJOEN is in mourning and that his brothers are supporting him. The photo below appears to be that of his young son who died in the Norval's Pont camp. The photographs were found together.

He was put into penal servitude at St Georges. The other identified with chin in hands is MAX TEINERT Prisoner No 26491 aged 27 years, a German, from 45 Thiergarten Strasse BRESLAU, GERMANY who was captured at PETRUSVILLE on the 8th September 1901 serving with the Malan Commando who was sent to Hawkins Island Bermuda where he was put into Penal Servitude.



Mourning Cover from KROONSTAD to GREEN POINT re-directed to SIMON'S Town marked "Not Bellevue" redirected to "The Armenian" marked" Not Armenian" to Bermuda marked "Not Darrell's", "Not Morgan's" reverse "Not Diyatalawa" and re- directed to Bombay from Ceylon.

The cover is addressed to ISAAC PIETER MINNAAR Prisoner No 29947 aged 36 years from MIDDELBURG TVL who was captured at NOOITGEDACHT on the 20th February 1901 together with his son DANIEL TAILLEFER MINNAAR Prisoner No 29946 aged 17 years who was sent to India with his father on the 6th March 1902.



Registered Incoming cover addressed to Rev. J.A. VAN BLERK at HAWKIN'S Island. By the time the letter had arrived he had left the Bermudas resulting in the cover being re-directed to New York and Chicago. It appears to have been advertised through the DLO Chicago?



Inter Camp from IRENE to MORGAN'S with Id ZAR optd ERI tied by Pretoria cds dated 14 APR 02 with British Censor Seal on the reverse addressed to BAREND JOHANNES BOTES Prisoner No 32162 aged 22 years from the farm MOOIPLAATS district PRETORIA who was captured at VAALKOP on the 10<sup>th</sup> January 1902 serving with the Pretoria Commando. The sender was his wife A.E. Botes in the Irene Concentration Camp.



Cover from ABERDEEN with 1d CGH tied by Aberdeen csd dated MR 7 02 with purple double oval PVM Censor cachet applied at Aberdeen on 7 Mar 1902 with pencil manuscript "KOLONIALER" indicating that he was a Cape Rebel. The cover is addressed to CHARLES JACOBUS KEMP Prisoner No 24821( not 24970) aged 19 years from ABERDEEN town who was captured in the Cape, the date unknown. He was sent to HAWKIN'S.



Cover to KROONSTAD CONCENTRATION CAMP with Id QV Bermuda tied by Hamilton cds dated JA 8 1902 with Type CM 1 censor cachet in blue on front with black P.B.C. censor cachet applied at Bloemfontein. The cover is addressed to MRS C.J. DU PLESSIS at the Kroonstad Concentration Camp from her husband in Bermuda. He was CARL JOHANNES DU PLESSIS Prisoner No 21333 aged 30 years from the farm BUFFELSBOUT district FAURESMITH who was captured on his farm serving with the Fauresmith Commando on the 3<sup>rd</sup> July 1901.



Cover front from PIETER JACOBUS BOSMAN Prisoner No 5144 aged 45 years from the farm BULDERSBEKHOEK district HOOPSTAD who was captured at Modder River on the 27 February 1900 serving with the Hoopstad Commando and who was sent to Bermuda. The addressee is his relative JAN JACOBUS BOSMAN Prisoner No 5143 aged 22 years from the farm RIETKUIL district LADYBRAND who was captured together with his father LOUIS DANIEL BOSMAN Prisoner 104477 aged 50 years at Paardeberg both serving with the Korannaberg Commando. JAN was sent to Diyatalawa in the City of

Vienna while his father was sent to Bermuda.

Opperman at Ou Dorp Klerksdorp most probably from OCKERT CORNELIUS OPPERMAN Prisoner No 21308 aged 43 years from WOLMARANSSTAD who was captured together with his son PHILIPPUS ALBERTUS OPPERMAN Prisoner No 21310 aged 19 years and brother RUDOLF JOHANNES OPPERMAN Prisoner No 21309 aged 45 years from the farm DOORNPAN district WOLMARANSSTAD on the  $2^{nd}$  August 1901 serving with the No1 Wolmaransstad Commando all of whom were sent to Bermuda.



Cover from Bermuda to Mrs J.P. Badenhorst at No 3 Camp Klerksdorp with 1d Bermuda QV adhesive tied by Hamilton cds dated JA 24 1902 with No 2 Censor eachet Bermuda in blue and black oval Johannesburg censor eachet on the front the reverse reveals London transit strike. The cover most probably from JAN HENDRIK BADENHORST Prisoner No 25458 aged 18 years (penkop) from the farm KLIPDRIF district KROONSTAD who was captured at JAGTERSHOEK on the 29th September 1901 serving with the Kroonstad Commando and who was sent to Bermuda.

Cover from DIYATALAWA to HARWARDEN CASTLE Cape Town and re-directed to Bermuda with 6c QV Ceylon tied Diyatalawa cds dated AP 5 01 with Type 1 Diyatalawa Censor cachet on front showing Colombo transit strike and Durban transit strike on the reverse flap. The cover is re-directed to Bermuda with a blue inscription to this effect and is marked in pencil "Not Darrell's " Burts ".

The cover is addressed to JAN ANDRIES LOMBARD Prisoner No 10754 aged 39 years from the farm OLIEVENHOUTKOM district ROUXVILLE who was captured at FOURIESBURG on the 30th July 1900 serving with the Swanepoel Commando. He was sent to Bermuda on the Armenian on the 29th May 1901.

His son CHRISTOFFEL WILHELMUS LOMBARD Prisoner No 7655 aged 21 years from the same farm was also captured with his father serving with the Rouxville Commando and was sent to DIYATALAWA on the RANEE. This letter was most probably from him to his father.



A cover from BERMUDA to FAURESMITH but re-directed to UITENHAGE (KABUSI?) with a 1d BERMUDA adhesive tied by a HAMILTON eds dated AP 2 1902 eds with violet Type 2 censor eachet on the front with the transit strikes of BETHULIE 17 MY 02 and arrival strike of UITEHAGE 29 MY 02 with octagonal black Uitenhage censor eachet on the front with red manuscript markings Uitenhage and PBC in red applied at Bloemfontein addressed to Miss Zia Venter of the farm BOSVARKFONTEIN district FAURESMITH. The woman on farms in Fauresmith district were sent to camps in Port Elizabeth and Uitenhage.

The cover sent by HENDRIK TJAART VENTER Prisoner No 20535 aged 53 years from the farm BOSVARKFONTEIN (Records erroneously refer to BOSCHWAARTFONTEIN), FAURESMITH district who was captured at KRANTZHOEK on the 7th June 1901 serving with the Van Zylspruit Commando and was sent to BERMUDA via TIN TOWN, LADYSMITH.

## BOER WAR: BERMUDA:

The prison camps were situated on the island of the Great Sound in close proximity to the capital HAMILTON. All the island or zones were under Martial Law and were patrolled by Navy Guard Ships. The islands were roughly divided in half resulting in the Boer POWs being accommodated in tents on one side while their guards were on the other. There were regulations enforced for the orderly management of the camps under line captains, Commandants and even a Landdrost who officiated over those who had committed offences. The camps were consigned to various ZONES. Zone 1, the furthest from Hamilton was TUCKER'S and MORGAN'S ISLANDS. The inmates of this camp were "Handsuppers" or "Khaki Boers" who had either already taken the Oath of Allegiance in South Africa and who had hoped not to be sent away or those who indicated they were prepared to accept British Rule. They were considered to have committed treason and were kept here for their own safety. This zone was closed at the end of August 1902.



# ZONE 2: BURT'S and DARRELL'S ISLANDS:

These were the first islands to be occupied. They were divided by barbed wire as mentioned above. Burt's was the smallest of the camps, the prisoner's area being not more than 150 meters in length and was allocated to those who were most opposed to British Rule. They were the dissidents or irreconcilables. Darrell's Island housed the telephone exchange and had a school. These camps were filled by July 1901 and held about 1480 men. This zone was empty by the middle of October 1902.

#### ZONE 3:

This comprised: HAWKIN'S ISLAND with two compounds, NELLY ISLAND with Naval water-catchment and tanks, LONG ISLAND with a cemetery and stone quarries, and PORT'S ISLAND the administrative HQ for all the camps. The camps and islands were connected with wooden footbridges. The convicts were marched via these to the quarries as well as the cemeteries where they were forced to dig graves.

## HAWKIN'S:

This camp accommodated more that 1000 POWs and 225 convicts. The enclosure for the convicts was situated on the northern side of the island facing the sea. It was cordoned off with two cordons of barbed wire and had a special guard tower. This camp only closed in August 1903 when some 50 irreconcilables who refused to take the Oath of Allegiance were evicted from the island and who were dumped and left to their own devices on the mainland. Some stayed on and eventually the last survivor of this group died there in 1927.

BURT'S ISLAND: Royal Engineers' Report & Survey (1903)

Lt. General Sir Henry Geary the Governor established this zone to be used as a boarding school in April 1902. It was equipped with barbed wire fence as the rest were but only had a lifespan of three months. Many youngsters were scattered about in the camps and needed a formal type of schooling. This island was left in the hands of the Boer teachers and along with Tucker's island was the first to close. It was called the "Khaki School" which the boys refused to attend if they did not have their own teachers. These youths were aged from eight to sixteen years. Children were chastised by the British teachers whom they were not prepared to acknowledge. Once their own teacher Albertus Willem Bester Prisoner No 25500 aged 28 years from the farm SCHIETFONTEIN district PRETORIA who was captured at SANDRIVIERPOORT on the 16th November 1901 serving with the Pretoria Commando was appointed, they freely attended school. He was replaced after a month. The school closed in July 1902. The child leaders THYS DE WET, GERT VOSLOO and DIRK ACKERMAN who represented the children as dissident "ringleaders" were handcuffed by hands and feet at night and were sjambokked until they relented their defiance to British authority.



# CENSORSHIP and CENSOR MARKINGS:

Four censors were employed at PORT'S ISLAND. Mr Brown was the first senior censor and later followed by Mr. R.F. Wilson. The third was Captain Biggs while the fourth is unknown.





OUTGOING: There was no restriction on letter writing. The Relief Committee on the island had provided paper and envelopes while stamps were available for purchase from camp Post Masters. The envelopes were handed in to the censor open with a stamp within which was attached by the Censor before posting. About 5000 letters were handled each week.

# INCOMING:

Hamilton Post Office handled all mail on arrival. Mail was randomly checked as all incoming mail had been censored at source. Mail to British sympathisers at Tucker's Island received prior attention. Mail sent there unclaimed was marked "NOT TUCKER'S". Unclaimed letters were sent from camp to camp and this accounts for the endorsements "NOT DARRELLS" and "TRY BURTS" and others.



# ROTATION OF PRISONERS:

POWs on the various islands were rotated to different camps when occasion demand it. When the British authorities detected that there was dissent or that they had reason to believe a plot was being hatched to escape prisoners were rotated to other camps by so doing splitting them up interfering with their arrangements. This is one of the reasons why the post to the islands was continually re-directed.

## AFTER THE DECLARATION OF PEACE:

After the Declaration of Peace the Camp Commandant required the POWs to sign the Oath of Allegiance before they could go home. Willing signatories were found on TUCKER"S and DARRELL'S but not on BURT'S and HAWKIN's where no one was prepared to sign. A Month after the end of the war consular agents were free to arrange repatriation of nationals prepared to pay their own fares. As a result 15 Germans sailed on the S.S. ROLAND on the 9th July 1902. On the 17th July 1902 the S.S. PRETORIA conveyed fare paying passengers to NEW YORK among them Generals A.P. Cronje, Wessels and Peter Ferreira.

Ferreira told reporters that there were three groups:

- Those who could afford to pay were free to leave.
- 2. Those who could not, waited for British transports to take them home.
- 3. The irreconcilables who were left to their own devices.

Those that returned inclusive of the convict element were landed at Simons Bay. The convicts were transported to TOKAI PRISON while the other POWs went via transit camps at UMBILO in DURBAN

The card is from MATTHEUS JOHANNES HOLLE(N)BRAND Prisoner no 19818 aged 34 years from the farm ELANDSRIVIER district PRETORIA who was captured at ELANDSRIVIER on the 2<sup>nd</sup> August 1901 and who was sent to BERMUDA via TIN TOWN LADYSMITH and most probably on the MONTROSE.

In the message on the card he discusses the Censor Seals and the stamps on covers to and from Bermuda.

Van der Merwe from her husband HENDRIK SCHALK VAN DER MERWE Prisoner No 22066 aged 24 years from the farm TWEELINGSFONTEIN district BOSHOF who was captured at PAARDEKRAAL at KRUGERSDORP on the 9th August 1901 together with his brothers BAREND FREDERICK VANDER MERWE Prisoner No 22064 aged 37 years and PHILIPPUS JOHANNES JACOBUS VAN DER MERWE Prisoner No 22065 aged 23 from the same farm and who, together with their brother were sent to the Tin Town at Ladysmith and ultimately to Bermuda.

After the War Rev. Van Blerk was active in obtaining assistance for the reconstruction of the infrastructure laid waste by the scorched earth policy of Kitchener. He was in Italy in 1903 as the card shows. Posteard from STRASSBURG dated 6/6/03 to NAPLES with 10pf Deutches Reich adhesive tied by Straasburgeds dated 6/6.03. The card is from Jan Loubser.




### BERMUDA: THE STORY OF L.M. DU PREEZ:

LUDOVIC MULDER DU PREEZ Prisoner No 6214 aged 31 years from the farm KLEINFONTEIN district Vrede was captured at Elandslaagte on the 21<sup>st</sup> October 1899 serving with the Vrede Commando. He was married to a nee Adendorff. Her names were SUSAN ELIZABETH, she hailed from VOLKSRUST. She kept contact with her husband after his capture until his return from BERMUDA as the following shows:

Cover from Convict Station at Cape Town from L.M. Du Preez to his wife with endorsement Censored S. Jarvis Capt S.O believed to be at The Castle. He must have been an irreconcilable. The second (without referring to the adhesives or cancellations) a mourning cover from his wife at Volksrust (her family home) to him at Cape Town.









Third letter from L.M. Du Preez to his wife at Volksrust with indications that he was now being held upon a transport as indicated by the Censor cachet of L. Heyman who was known to be a censor aboard a transport ship of the British followed by a telegram cover to him dated 23 December 1900 showing he was still held in Cape Town.

## CONNECTIONS WITH MISS OUTERBRIDGE AFTER THE WAR:

Miss Outerbridge was the most outspoken supporter of the Boer cause in the Bermudas. Her intentions were philanthropic although she was known to have harboured escapees and interceded on behalf of the POWs with the authorities. She provided some with work and did what she could to obtain aid for the Boer POWs to provide them with the amenities of life they needed in the camps. Working with Mrs Selina Recht and Captain Meyer and his wife a number of escapes were arranged and made good. The most well known escape being that of Fritz Duquesne.

Miss Anna Maria Outerbridge had a communication network in operation to obtain relief for the POWs from Boston in America. She had the assistance of Miss Helen Parker in New York who did what she could there to make known the plight of the Boers in the camps at Bermuda. This special woman kept the POWs sustained in their will to fight, she uplifted their morale despite inhuman odds for a victory against overwhelming odds. They did not forget her kindness as the postcard sent to her in April 1905 shows.

The card was sent by PERCY LIONEL MADER Prisoner No 14592 aged 27 years at the time he was captured who came from the Railway Station at VILJOENDRIFT where he was captured on the 15th October 1900 serving with the Heilbron Commando who was sent to Bermuda as a POW on the ARMENIAN on the 29th May 1901.

# BOER PRISONERS OF WAR BERMUDA: MANUSCRIPT MARKS IN INK, PENCIL OR CRAYON:

Post re-directed at Bermuda was endorsed by hand indicating the rotation of prisoners between the various islands. This was done to prevent the POWs escaping and to prevent them forming bonds to create insurrection.

Cover from STELLENBOSCH with 2 X CGH adhesives tied with Stellenbosch ads dated 9 DE 01 with violet boxed censor cachet of Stellenbosch on the front with Hamilton arrival strike on the reverse. The front shows ink manuscript" NOT DARRELL'S" on the front. The cover is addressed to WILLEM BACHOFNER Prisoner no 19450 aged 38 years from ERMELO who was captured at KLIPFONTEIN on the 26th May 1901 and who was sent to Burts Island Bermuda.



Cover from PRETORIA (with GB adhesives applied) 2x Id GB 1 Lilac tied by a Pretoria eds dated 12 DEC 01 with black triangular censor cachet applied at Pretoria. The cover is addressed to GERT DIEDERICK DE BEER Prisoner No 207 29 aged 24 years from the farm KJLIPKOP district Rustenberg who was captured at MAMPAS RIVER on the 1" July 1901 serving with the Rustenburg Commando and who was sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith.



#### BOER PRISONERS OF WAR ON BERMUDA:

Inter Camp cover from ALIWAL NORTH CONCENTRATION CAMP to BERMUDA with 1d CGH tied by aliwal North eds date illegible with adhesive tied over by British Censor Seal Type 34 which is a white seal used principally in Cape Town and other places such as Bredasdorp, Gordons Bay, Kimberley, Paarl and a few other places but seldom mentioned from Aliwal North. Here it was tied over by a violet double oval Censor cachet Aliwal north dated 16 May 1902. The front has usual manuscript note "Not Darrells" on the front. The reverse shows Hamilton arrival strike dated 23 JU 1902 and no censor mark as it arrived after hostilities had ended. The cover is from Mrs D. Hoffman to her husband DANIEL CORNELIS HOFFMAN Prisoner No 25807 aged 66 from the farm HOFFMANSRUST district WEPENER who was captured on his farm on the 2<sup>nd</sup> September 1901 and who was sent to Bermuda.

Inter Camp postcard from BERMUDA to DIYATALAWA with pre-stamped 1/2d adhesive tied by Hamilton eds dated FE 25 1902 with Colombo transit strike dated MR 10 02 on the front with circular "T" and Rectangular black Taxed cachet "Amount to be collected "5" Centimes" with blue censor markings and Diyatalawa Type 2 E.J.B. Censor cachet E.J.B. (Baumann) censor cachet on the front. The cover is addressed to JAN JACOBUS LUDIK Prisoner No 27171 aged 12years (Penkop) from KLERKSDORP TOWN who was captured at TWEELINGSPAN on the 13th December 1901 serving with the Klerksdorp Commando and who was sent to Ceylon.



In the ABW Philatelist dealing with the POW camps overseas research states that four censors were employed at Ports Island between June 1901 and June 1902. Four handstamp censor marks have been recorded with a further two sub types. No censor seals were used on the islands. The first and the commonest censor mark is an un-numbered 24cm diameter double circle circle mark with "PRISONERS OF WAR/BEREMUDA between the circles and "Passed/Censor" in the centre. It was applied from 16th July 1901 to the 13th June 1902. The mark numbered "2" is larger than type 1 consisting of a double bordered single circle 28mm in diameter with "PRISONERS OF WAR/BERMUDA" around the perimeter and in the centre "PASSES CENSOR" with line above and and numeral "2" below. It appeared from 5th November 1901 to 27th June 1902. Many cover have manuscript endorsements "Not Darells" "Not Tuckers" etc on the fronts indicating that the prisoners were rotated between different camps and that their post was re-directed. Cover from BRUSSLES Belgium( with one adhesive torn away) with 10 C adhesive tied by Brussels eds dated DEC 12 01 with Type 1 blue Censor eachet on the front. The cover is addressed to: MARIUS CORNELIUS SCHENER Prisoner No

21438 aged 24 years from Pretoria who was captured at BLOEDRIVER on the 29th July 1901 serving with the Pretoria Commando a Hollander who was sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith.



Cover from a POW on BERMUDA to GRONINGEN Holland and re-directed to Zivolle with 2 ½ d QV Bermuda adhesive tied by a Hamilton eds dated AP 2 1901 with Bermuda Type 2 censor cachet and Groningen arrival strike dated 15 APR 02 on the front. The reverse shows Groningen transit and Zivolle arrival strike on the reverse.

The reverse shows Ladysmith arrival and transit strike as also Durban and Hamilton. The Cover is addressed to CAREL LODEWIJK VAN DER MERWE Prisoner No 18014 aged 36 years from the farm KRANSSPRUIT district KROONSTAD who was captured at Kroonstad on the 14the March 1901 serving with the Mid Valsch River Commando and initially sent to Green Point.



Cover from ROODEPOORT to BERMUDA with Id ZAR opid ERI tied by Roodepoort csd dated 27 JAN 02 with partial black Johannesburg censor eachet on the front with Johannesburg and Hamilton transit and arrival strikes on the reverse. The manuscripts "Not Darrells and Not Hawkins" in pencil manuscript appear on the front. The cover is addressed to JAN CHRISTOFFEL VAN GRAAN Prisoner No 11258 aged 34 years from ROODEPOORTB TOWN district KRUGERSDORP who was captured at Roodepoort on the 26th August 1900 serving with the De Villiers Commando.

The reverse shows a Bermuda arrival strike dated 13 Jan 1902.

The cover is addressed to WILLEM MARTINUS SCOTT Prisoner No 20355 aged 51 years from the farm DE LA REYSFONTEIN district WINBURG who was captured at WELGEVONDEN on the 26th May 1901 together with his son JAN DU BOIS SCOTT Prisoner No 20356 aged 14 years both serving with the Winburg Commando and who were sent to Bermuda via Ladysmith Tin Town Camp.
